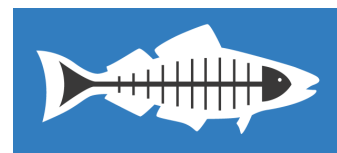

Coastal Cleanup Day is the largest volunteer day in the State of California, with cleanup sites stretching from

Mexico to the Oregon border and inland to Lake Tahoe.

The California Coastal Commission has led Coastal Cleanup Day in California since 1985.

During that time, Californians have removed over 1.5 million pounds of debris.

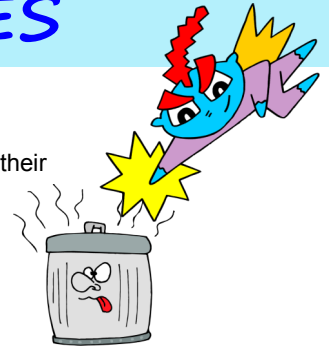


CLEANUP SUPERHEROES

Don't let their size fool you, these kids were cleanup superheroes in their South Los Angeles neighborhoods.

Students at St. Raphael's Elementary School (pictured to the left, immediately below, and the bottom right corner) served as site captains, organizing the cleanup and even leading the safety talk.



At Wisdom Academy for Young Scientists, a pint-sized volunteer and her mother decided to join in the cleanup to spruce up the appearance of an abandoned lot in the neighborhood, which is being developed into a park to be unveiled in 2013 as Ways Reading and Fitness Park. They got their hands dirty in the process, making a visible difference in their community.





More than 676 students from 11 different schools learned about the ocean and sea animals at the eighth annual **Coastal Cleanup Education Day**, held this year on Tuesday, September 11, 2012. Heal the Bay staff and volunteers led the students through four fun stations—Fatal Food Relay, Beach Exploration, the Santa Monica Pier Aquarium, and Beach Cleanup. For many students, Ed Day is their first trip to the beach. The mixture of fun and education leaves a lasting impression, helping to create the next generation of ocean stewards.

Schools are grouped into teams once they arrive, and their first task of the event is to create a team name. The Great White Sharks (*seen on the right*) were ferocious competitors this year, even coming up with a signature pose. Once a team name is selected, the fun and learning begins!!!

Station 1 Fatal Food Relay

In the relay (*pictured at the top of the page*) kids are the ocean animals, running to grab unmarked bags, which turn out to be either yummy seafood or “fatal food.” Kids who pick the seafood get to continue in the race while those who pick the trash get sent to the “hospital.” This activity demonstrates how easily animals mistake trash for food and end up suffering from ingestion

Station 2 Beach Exploration

Beach exploration, which involves digging and sifting in the sand (*pictured to the right*), dipping toes in the ocean, and looking for sea animals is always a big hit on Coastal Cleanup Education Day. Students explore the beach through a scientific lens, learning about the ocean ecosystem, sea animals, and their natural habitats while enjoying their time on the sand near the salty water.





Station 3 The Aquarium

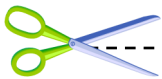
The Santa Monica Pier Aquarium is home to more than 100 species of marine animals and plants, all found right outside the doors of the Aquarium in the Santa Monica Bay. Students get a true hands-on experience with the sea life they are learning about throughout the day. The touch tanks (*pictured below*) are always a popular stop!



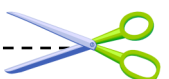
Station 4 Beach Cleanup

The final stop is a beach cleanup. Students use a kid-friendly data card featuring the most common trash found on the beach. This year they picked up 100 pounds of trash and five feet of cigarette butts (*being measured in the "Butt-o-meter" in the picture on the left*).

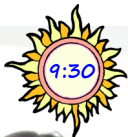

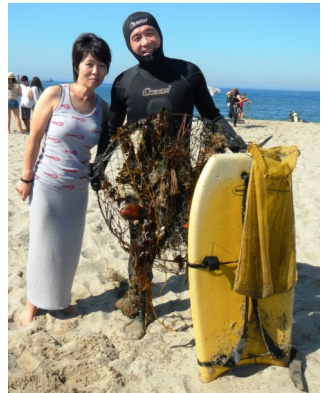

BAY STREET HISTORIC SITE

Historic preservation and environmental protection are distinct fields which both share common interests, values, and goals of protecting and preserving what is valuable to our community. The Santa Monica beach site close to Tower 20 at the end of Bay Street, sometimes referred to as the "Ink Well," was a popular hangout for African Americans from the 1920s to the early 1960s, long after attempts at racial restrictions on public beaches were invalidated in 1927. With the help of historian Alison Rose Jefferson, Heal the Bay created a cleanup on this site for Coastal Cleanup Day 2012. The inclusion of this site allowed Heal the Bay to bring the elements of historic preservation and environmental protection together with the assistance of the Santa Monica Conservancy and the California Historical Society.

When news spread about this site and the screening of **White Wash** (a documentary about the history of African American and water culture that was included in the activities of Coast Weeks), many groups and individuals came forward to participate, including Blacksurfing.com, the Los Angeles Black Underwater Explorers, Los Angeles County Lifeguards, the Black Surfing Association, the Santa Monica Public Library, and others. The combined efforts of all of these groups made this a truly special day at the beach for the 434 volunteers who came out to clean and learn.

It was an amazing day of action, education, and remembrance of our collective history. We reaffirmed that we stand united by our love of the ocean, remembering the past and moving forward together as stewards of this precious environment and our history.

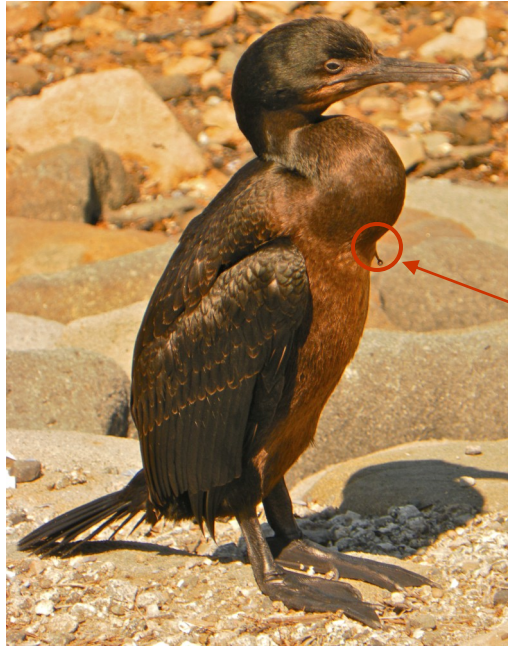

BALLONA WETLANDS RESTORATION

Each year, Friends of Ballona Wetlands joins in Coastal Cleanup Day to combine cleanup efforts of the wetlands with their restoration project. Restoring the Ballona Wetlands involves removing invasive plants and planting new native plants.

During the cleanup this year, volunteers noticed a disturbing amount of fishing hooks and fishing lines in the area, and found an injured cormorant with a **hook through its chest (pictured on the left)**. The injured bird was reported to Marine Animal Rescue.

If you find an injured bird or animal on an L.A. County beach, let a lifeguard know. In any other location or if no lifeguards are on duty, Heal the Bay encourages you to contact a rescue organization in your area, but not to try to capture an injured animal on your own. Friends of Ballona Wetlands has a list of emergency contacts on their website at ballonafriends.org.

HEAL THE BAY REACHES TO SOUTH AFRICA

Heal the bay staffer Sarah Sikich, Coastal Resources Director, had the chance to participate in Coastal Cleanup Day on the international level while traveling in South Africa. Sarah dedicated much of her own personal time while vacationing to participate in non-profit activities far away from home.

She helped the South African Shark Conservancy with Coastal Cleanup Day and assisted in their monitoring of Southern Right Whales within and outside of a reserve in Hermanus. Sarah also volunteered with the Cape Leopard Trust, educating children from Zenzeleni Waldorf School (Khayelitsha) in the Cederberg natural area.

"Volunteering overseas was a great way to explore South Africa. Although many of the beaches were quite clean, I was reminded of the global threat of plastic pollution when wrappers and foam bits floated by in the surf." Sarah also reflected on South Africa's efforts to reduce pollution by saying, "I was impressed by their plastic pollution prevention policies, like charging for plastic bags, and will be continually inspired by the bountiful wildlife and friendly people that I met during my travels."

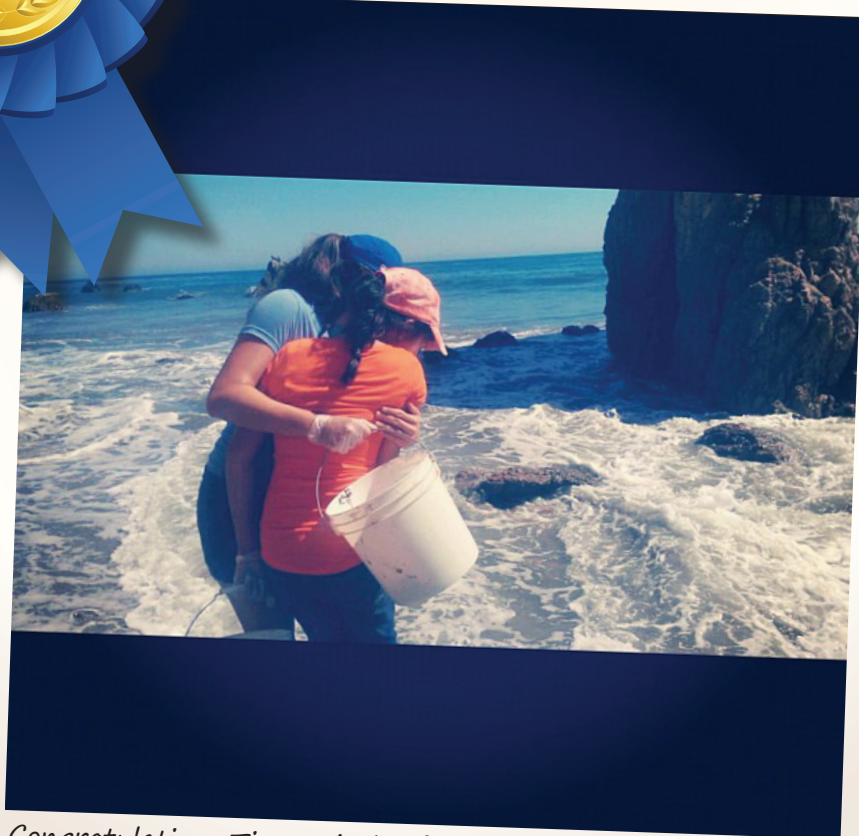

THEY FOUND WHAT!?

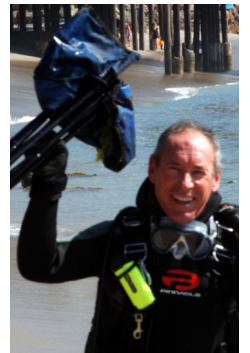

They not only found the boat, but hauled it over rough terrain to an access road where a state park crew could pick it up.

Volunteers in Agoura Hills came across this barrel of oil sludge on the verge of tipping into Medea Creek. Thankfully, they were able to dispose of it properly before it entered the water and made its way into the ocean. If you come across hazardous materials or fire hazards (i.e. paint, oil, coolant, or other hazardous waste), you should contact your local municipal public works department.
