CCD: A World Wide Event


In 1984, the first Coastal Cleanup Day was organized by Oregonian Judie Neilson to remove plastic debris littering the coastline.

In 1985, inspired by the 2,800 who came to Oregon's cleanup, the California Coastal Commission organized a Coastal Cleanup Day for California beaches

In 1986, the Ocean Conservancy, then called The Center for Marine Conservation, set up and ran the first Coastal Cleanup Day in Texas. As years progressed, the organization went on to lead world wide CCD efforts.

In 1990, Heal the Bay became the official coordinator of Coastal Cleanup Day for L.A. County.

Coastal Cleanup Day is now the largest volunteer event dedicated to ocean and waterway health.



Coastal Cleanup

On September 18th, 720 elementary school students from underserved schools, joined together for fun and hands-on learning. This is Heal the Bay's 9th year organizing Coastal Cleanup Education Day. We are grateful to our friends at Mattel for their sponsorship which makes the day possible.





Upon arrival students joined their group leader, decided on their team name and began their rotation. Each of the stations taught a lesson about watershed health and pollution, therefore educating L.A.'s youth to be the next wave of environmental stewards.

Education Day

Station 1: Beach Exploration

The team works together to dig in the sand and observe the different creatures living near the shoreline. It's fun to explore, feel the breeze and get a little wet in the ocean too!

Station 2: Fatal Food Relay

This mock-race activity portrays how easily animals ingest harmful trash, by mistaking it as food. When each relay runner gets to the end, they must quickly choose from a group of unmarked paper bags. Upon opening the bag, the runner either gets trash, sending them to the hospital, or they get "food", allowing them to continue the relay-race.

Station 3: The Aquarium

This part of the rotation brings each group into the Santa Monica Aquarium. Here the students learn about the plants and animals that live in the Pacific Ocean. They also get to handle species in the super neat touch tanks.

Station 4: The Cleanup

Here, each group combs the beach, removing small and large pieces of litter. All the trash removed is recorded on a data card, which gives us a better understanding of the trash that is picked up. This year 8 feet of cigarette butts were removed!



Heal the Bay & KTLA

Gayle Anderson of KTLA came down to the Santa Monica Pier Aquarium before CCD for a sneak preview of the fun extra events planned for Saturday the 21st. She met the aquarium animals and learned about the exciting aquatic activities planned for participants. The next day Gayle traveled to Ken Malloy Regional Park in Harbor City, where she and crew observed the many birds inhabiting Machado Lake and learned the extensive history of this inland Coastal Cleanup site.

Largest Site: Dockweiler Tower 55

This year, the largest site boasted 1,658 cleanup participants. This is the largest gathering we've had at Tower 55. Headed by experienced "Nothing But Sand" Heal the Bay beach captains Terumi Toyoshima, Jerry and Joady Gorelick and their fellow beach captain friends, the cleanup organized and supplied 1,600+ volunteers, including 550 early bird cleaners from PAVA. In total the volunteers removed over 800 pounds of trash, most of which were small pieces of plastic and Styrofoam.









The Pacific American Volunteer Association (PAVA) showed in full force, while Laura Caulfield from Yoga Trailblazers led a free yoga class to invigorate volunteers before the cleanup.

Dockweiler State Beach





As you can see, it was crowded at Dockweiler on CCD! Many people brought their own trash collecting supplies from home and our estimates show that 100 people at Tower 55 created zero-waste on Coastal Cleanup Day. So next year don't forget to bring your own reusable garden gloves and a bucket!

Runner-Up: Santa Monica 1550

Down at Santa Monica Pier a whole day of activities were planned by Heal the Bay, Landshark Lager, Naam Yoga and ECO Dive Center to celebrate CCD. Over 1,300 volunteers cleaned the Santa Monica Pier area on land and sea! ECO Dive Center coordinated the dive cleanup and removed plenty of fishing line and plastic debris.









Naam Yoga paid homage to International Peace Day by creating a Peace Circle before the cleanup. Art Salter and his team of family and friends, in addition to the Santa Monica Pier Aquarium staff, ran the show like experts, sharing safety guidelines and information about how trash ends up at the beach.

Historic Inkwell Beach

This Santa Monica beach site at Bay Street, sometimes known as the "Inkwell," was a popular hangout for African Americans from the 1920s to the early 1960s. This was the home beach to Nick Gabaldon, a Santa Monica College student and first documented local surfer of African American and Mexican descent. At this site Gabaldon and others challenged racism to enjoy beach public space.





Historic Inkwell Beach gathered a whopping 656 participants all meeting at Bay Street in Santa Monica. The captains, Alex Tower, Allison Jefferson, and Greg Rachal, along with their team, were happy to see an increase in participants from last year by over 200 volunteers. Those who came out learned about the background of this beach spot, With only two years as a CCD site, it is plain to see that this is going to be a CCD favorite.

Pick A Site, Any Site

This year, Angelinos had a choice of 50+ different cleanup sites all over L.A. County. There were sites organized to clean-up schools, neighborhoods and parks, creeks, rivers, and under freeway over passes. We had people cleaning up marinas by kayak and stand -up paddle board and we even had scuba divers clean-up next to piers. Oh...and don't forget there were beach cleanup sites too, obviously!

No matter what site you chose to be at on CCD, you made an impact on the amount of pollution in the ocean and on the beach.

Have you ever looked into a stormdrain? That opening is basically a trap for trash. The trash is suppose to be sucked out during routine maintenance, but with so many catch basins, they can't afford to keep up. Water on our streets push the trash completely untreated through miles of drainage pipes that either lead to creeks or rivers and out to the ocean. This causes water pollution. Also, animals think these broken down pieces of trash are food, causing them illness or even death!

To combat this, we should never let trash fall into the street. A Styrofoam cup in Pacoima can become thousands of tiny pieces on its journey down the Los Angeles River out to the Pacific Ocean.

Always pick up trash you see and make sure it gets to a container where it cannot escape. It is everyone's responsibility to keep our planet clean!

Be the Change for the Future

Coastal Cleanup Day is not only a day to remove trash from our county, but also a day to bring the community together to recognize current environmental issues. The first CCD was created because one woman saw a huge amount of plastic debris littering the coastline. Like that woman, we must all be stewards of our land and address the causes that lead to litter in our parks, beaches, streets and waterways. Although the answer may be complex, actions can be taken to lessen the impact our daily practices have on the environment.

All of our actions affect the future for later generations who will be living in Los Angeles. There is no doubt that removing trash on Coastal Cleanup Day sets the tone for taking ownership and maintaining our habitat clean. But we can and should do more, so each year Heal the Bay works to make CCD better.

We have come a long way on our path to heal the ocean. For example, many cities in the county have adopted a ban on single use plastic bags. All of us have the capacity to adopt the practice of using reusable bags. If we think about how many single use plastic bags are saved from entering land fills and waterways by bringing our reusable bags, the outcome is worth the challenge and change.





Create Zero Waste Cleanups











This year Heal the Bay asked cleanup participants to bring their cleanup supplies from home to avoid using plastic bags and rubber gloves. We suggested that people bring garden gloves or work gloves, and we only gave out one rubber glove to each person who did not bring their own reusable gloves. We also asked people to bring a bucket to hold the trash they collected. In addition, Heal the Bay provided many sites with many garden gloves, burlap sacks and cotton tote bags that could be washed and reused after CCD. Estimates show that this year about 2,500 people brought their own supplies, thus engaging in the zero waste efforts! We are happy to see this increase and hope that the zero waste number grows in the coming years.

Why Should it go Extinct?

Americans alone throw away over 100 billion bags a year. Plastic bags account for over 10 percent of the debris washed up on the U.S. coastline. Since 1989, plastic bags are among the top 5 items of debris most often found during the CA Coastal Cleanup Day. In 2012, volunteers found 235 animals entangled in marine debris.

How Can You Help?
